Orange Shirt Day – September 20, 2019

Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of the St. Joseph Mission residential school commemoration event held in Williams Lake, BC, Canada, which was first held in the spring of 2013. It grew out of an account by a former First Nations student who had her orange shirt taken away on her first day of school at the Mission, and has evolved into an opportunity to keep the discussion on all aspects of residential schools going on an annual basis. The end of September was selected as the date of recognition, as it represented the time of year when First Nations, Métis and Inuit children were taken away from their homes to be placed in residential schools. This year, Orange Shirt Day falls on a Monday. On that day, members are encouraged to talk to fellow staff and students about the legacy of the residential school system, as well as how we can all work together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come.

Harvey on TVO – The Agenda

The education file has proven to be a tough one for the Ontario PC government, and it doesn't appear to be getting any easier as the province and unions prepare to head to the bargaining table. The Agenda welcomes Harvey Bishchof, president of the ýOntario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, to discuss what's at stake for teachers, the government, and ultimately students.



Class Size Consultation – Remember this?

The Ford Government is not being transparent when it comes to recent consultations on



education. Numerous groups (Parents for Public Education, Scarborough Families for Public Education, and West End Parents for Public Education) have all filed freedom of information requests after the ministry of education said "After careful review, the Ministry has determined the records must be withheld." More than 6500 submissions were received.



NEW STUDY – Violence in Schools

A study from the University of Ottawa suggests a sharp increase in violence teachers face while working in schools (mainly elementary). 1600 educators were surveyed during the 2017/2018 school year. A survey conducted in 2005 showed 7% of teachers experiencing bullying over their careers compared to 54% of respondent's experienced physical violence in the most recent survey. 72% reported explicit verbal insults, while 41% saying they had similar encounters with parents.
